Meet Annamarie Reno, City Manager, Mascotte



How long have you been an FCCMA member and why did you join?

I joined the FCCMA on May 5, 2022, shortly after starting my position with the City of Mascotte on February 1, 2022. Prior to that, I worked as a Township Manager in Michigan, where I was a member of the MME.

Are you an ICMA member? Why did you join, and how long have you been a member? Yes, I am an ICMA member. I joined around March of 2022.

Please describe your areas of formal/advanced education.

I hold a degree in International Business Management, with an Associate in the Arts and

Science. This past July, I also received my ICMA- CM credentials, and, in March, will be participating in a two-year course through FSU to obtain my CPM certification.

Why did you select a career in public service?

I started my schooling with the intent to go into a career in public administration and then switched to Finance and then to International Business Management. The economic and legal implementation of dealing and working internationally fascinated me. During my last year in the program, before obtaining my degree, I and two other students had the opportunity to sit in and be a part of the NAFTA talks and debates that were held in Grand Rapids Michigan. I worked in the private sector for a few years before realizing that my passion was in helping my community. I actually started out as an elected official, serving for almost fourteen years before I decided to take my schooling and degree and made the leap into management, realizing that I could serve my community more effectively in an official managerial capacity.

Have you always been in the public sector, or have you had experience in the private sector?

I worked in the private sector for about seven years. I started my career working for a Fortune 500 brokerage firm auditing/balancing their American Stocks and Option accounts. I then went on to work as an HR coordinator and assistant to the VP of a Fortune 500 rental company before realizing that community and family were more important than the hustle and bustle of corporate life and made the switch to government.

Please tell us about your current position and give a brief job description if you are not a City Administrator/Manager.

Currently, I am a City Manager and have served in this capacity for the past two years in Florida and seven years prior in Michigan. Before that, as I stated, I was an elected official in a small northern Michigan community. As the City Manager of a small Florida community, it is my job to oversee the day-to-day functions of the city however, being in a small community that had no parks and recreation positions or events that were taking place, I took it upon myself (with the ok from council) to start up a community event planning committee which now brings events to the residents of our town.

Cyber Security Incident Response in a Small Town

Almost every IT Support Specialist fears the dreaded phrase: "I clicked on something, and now my computer is acting weird." The looming threat of cybersecurity lingers quietly over organizations around the globe. Like a natural disaster, cities can be struck by a cybersecurity attack at any time, losing millions of dollars to hackers. It has become such a prominent issue that states across the country are pushing legislation to better protect themselves from cyber-attacks.

Prompting Information Technology (IT) Departments to ensure staff are prepared for these situations through training, exercises, and even by sending

out fake test emails to ensure security. However, all the training in the world doesn't guarantee that your organization won't have a cybersecurity incident. So, how can we best handle a cyber security incident when they do occur?

Well, that's exactly what the Indian Harbour Beach IT Department had to accomplish after receiving the previously mentioned message.

First, make sure to take the device off the network. This is critical; many users will panic and pull the power plug, but this is not what you should do, as this can often prevent access to the system after a shutdown, and an investigation will be necessary later. Therefore, ensure that the user receives clear instructions. Be sure to get IT support onsite as quickly as possible to disconnect the internet cable, disable Bluetooth and Wi-Fi, and remove any other peripherals that may be attached (thumb drives, taking any USB storage devices for investigation).

Second, inform city leadership of the incident. Making them aware that this takes priority over all other projects. Upon arrival, IT engages in damage control, working to isolate the incident. They access the PC and work with the user to answer security questions: When did it happen? What were you working on? After some investigating, IT determined that an email was opened, after which odd things started happening and

the user's computer icons changed. There was no way of opening any document on the device. With the PC off the network, ensuring the damage cannot spread, and knowing what the threat is, IT has to switch gears fast, knowing that every moment counts in these scenarios.

U.S. Department of Transportation Announces \$1.25 Billion in Direct, Accessible Grants for Local Communities to Improve Roadway Safety

The U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT) has opened the process for cities, towns, counties, Tribal governments, and Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPO) to apply for \$1.256 billion in funding for local projects that improve roadway safety. The funds are from the competitive grant program, Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A), which was created in President Biden's Bipartisan Infrastructure Law to help communities both plan and carry out projects that help reduce the number of deaths and serious injuries on our highways, streets, and roads. The SS4A grant program is a major action that supports funding to advance the DOT's National Roadway Safety Strategy, which launched in 2022 to address the high number of traffic deaths happening across the country.

SS4A funds will help communities in the development of road safety action plans and improve unsafe roadway corridors by implementing effective interventions. Additionally, these funds can be utilized to test out safety features such as separated bicycle lanes or curb extensions at intersections.

"Every community knows some intersection or stretch of road that is dangerous to approach - now we have an opportunity to make them safer," said U.S. Transportation Secretary Pete Buttigieg. "The Biden-Harris administration is proud to make over \$1.2 billion available for projects that can save lives on our roads, from highway redesigns to protected bike lanes, and we invite communities of every size to apply."

Last year, DOT announced more than 1,000 communities in total received \$1.7 billion in grants under SS4A, impacting roadway safety for around 70% of the nation's population and over 60% of traffic fatalities that occurred between 2017 and 2021. With more than \$1 billion available this year, the Department encourages all interested communities to apply, especially communities that have not applied to date. For Planning and Demonstration Grants, DOT has further encouraged communities with higher needs to apply by providing additional award consideration to those with higher fatality rates. The

Department compiled a <u>non-exhaustive list</u> of the cities and counties that meet that threshold online and will continue to support the information needs of these localities throughout the application period.

The application process for SS4A is designed to be as easy as possible and increased accessibility to this program in this latest funding round, particularly for smaller communities, Tribal governments and recipients new to Federal funding. This includes multiple deadlines and a longer application period for planning proposals, a preapplication review opportunity to determine eligibility before applying for implementation funding, and clarification about the use of Tribal Transportation Program funds as eligible for local match.

Applications may come from individual communities or groups of communities and may include MPOs, counties, cities, towns, other special districts that are subdivisions of a state, certain transit agencies, federally recognized Tribal governments, and multijurisdictional groups of eligible applicants.

The Safe Streets and Roads for All Notice of Funding Opportunity can be found <u>here</u>. Applications for Implementation Grants are by May 16. Planning and demonstration grant applicants will have three opportunities to apply with the deadlines of April 4, May 16, and August 29.
